The movie *Awakenings* features Dr. Malcolm Sayer who is hired to work at a chronic hospital in the Bronx. He works with a group of catatonic patients who are suffering from the effects of the disease, encephalitis lethargica ("sleeping sickness"). Through research and working with the patients, Dr. Sayer tries to help find a way to "awaken" the patients. He gives them an experimental drug, L-Dopa (used for Parkinsons disease) with the hope of giving them a chance to live again, if it is successful. The movie is based on real life events and people who were afflicted with the 1917-28 epidemic of encephalitis lethargica.

As he paces in cramped circles, over and over, the movement of his powerful soft strides is like a ritual dance around a center in which a mighty will stands paralyzed.

Only at times, the curtain of the pupils lifts, quietly--. An image enters in, rushes down through the tensed, arrested muscles, plunges into the heart and is gone.

7.	Describe Leonard's experience with Dr. Sayer when he takes him out of the hospital for the first time. What does he do? How does he react?
8.	Based on the evidence and your thoughts, do you think it was worth it for the patients to take L-Dopa?
